

"Acoustical panels are wall panels that offer sound absorbing or sound diffusing properties to better the sound quality of a room. Acoustical panels typically target sound issues such as excessive reverberation, echo, and high levels of noise."

GRADUATING RELATIVES



A RECIPE: "CELEBRATION MEATBALLS"

These meatballs are very good. Some tasters love the sauce just the way it was, but others found it t a little bit too tangy. To control flavor, start with less chili sauce and add more to taste.

Ingredients	Directions
1 pound ground chuck (Luse 80-20.) 1/2 cup breadcrumbs 1/3 cup minced onions 1/4 cup milk 1 egg 1 teaspoon chopped fresh parsley 1 teaspoon salt 1/8 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire 1/4 cup olive oil 1 jar (12 ounces) chili sauce	In a bowl, combine all ingredients <u>except</u> oil, chili sauce, and grape jelly. Mix thoroughly. Shape into 1-inch balls. In a skillet over medium-high heat, warm the oil. Add meatballs and brown on all sides. Drain meatballs on paper towels. Pour off fat from skillet. Add chili sauce and grape jelly and cook over medium heat, stirring until jelly is melted. Return meatballs to pan and <u>gently stir until thoroughly coated</u> . Simmer uncovered for 30 minutes. Makes 20-24 meatballs.
1 jar (10 ounces) grape jelly (I use a little more jelly.)	ENJOY!!
